

## From the President

**MAGPIES** The HMAC magpies have calmed down and we're friends once again. Please don't feed them or they associate humans with food and you get no peace if you're eating something.

**RUNWAY** The dashed centre line for a 12 m wide X 120 m long runway is now marked and in use - see photos below. Apart from that, the field remains unchanged. This suits everyone. Advanced flyers can enjoy the challenge of landing on the centre line, or you can land on the field wherever you like. Note that you must not land or take off directly towards the flight line as there are people there. You must not taxi in the pits area for the same reason. There are taxi ways at either end of the flight line.







**NEAT & TIDY** Our landlord is the Department for Environment & Water (DEW) and they inspect HMAC on a regular basis, so we need to keep the place neat and tidy. I've been tidying up, taking rubbish to the tip and getting rid of the old flight line bollards. The hatch covers were identified as a tripping hazard and are now bright yellow. The container was only approved on a temporary basis and will be cleared and sold off soon.

**INFORMED** I want members to know what's happening in their club and in future, John will publish what happened in the committee meeting in Buzz. You'll see reports from various areas, general business and the task list.

**SHOW & TELL** The first Friday evening from 7:30 pm is a social gathering with an occasional guest speaker. At the September meeting David Mifsud, president of MASA told us how they support clubs and encourage flying activities. Come along and chat to fellow club members.

## Holdfast Model Aero Club Christmas function 2025 Please put December 7th in your diary

The HMAC Christmas function will be held at Club Marion on Sunday, December 7 from 12:00 noon. A separate room has been booked, similar to previous years at the venue. This year, instead of finger food, the committee decided on a \$48 per person package deal which includes a choice between two main meals and a dessert. (Other options are much dearer)

The main meals offered are a choice between:

- roast turkey breast (GF) with roast potatoes, vegetables, turkey gravy & cranberry sauce: or
- Black Angus sirloin steak (GF) grilled to medium with potato & spring onion rosti, bordelaise sauce and broccolini.

#### Mosquito – The RAF's Legendary Wooden Wonder and Its Most Extraordinary Mission



I added this book to my collection because I did not have a book dedicated to the de Havilland Mosquito, one of the most remarkable aircraft of WW2 and one that was flown by many Australians.

When I started reading it, I realised that the book tells two stories. The first is the development and flying operations of the Mosquito. The second is the story of the Danish Resistance and the clandestine operations of the British Special Operations Executive (SOE) that organized and armed the Resistance. The two stories run in parallel and intertwine in some places.

While the many different missions performed by the Mosquito are described, the main focus is on one mission type – very high precision (and exceptionally dangerous) low level bombing raids aimed at Gestapo prisons that held high-value Resistance prisoners. These were carried out mainly by 140 Wing of 2 Group RAF, which consisted of 3 squadrons - 21 RAF, 464 RAAF and 487 RNZAF. The commander of 2 Group was the intrepid AVM Basil Embry RAF.



It is generally well known that the RAF initially rejected the proposal that became the Mosquito, and that de Havilland proceeded to a prototype on its own initiative. I was surprised to learn that the cause of the RAF's change of heart was the keen interest shown by Gen. 'Hap' Arnold, commander of the US Army Air Force. Being a descendant of successful streamlined wooden types such as the DH88 Comet racer and the elegant DH91 Albatross airliner, the Mosquito prototype proved to be all it promised and more, with few if any teething problems. It wasn't long before everyone wanted Mosquitoes.

I must make special mention of the author's lovely turn of phrase when he described the Mosquito as follows: 'The beautifully streamlined Mosquito, its radiators cleverly buried in the wing roots, was simply the smallest amount of airframe you could shrink-wrap around a crew of two, a couple of thousand pounds of bombs and a pair of Merlins'(p.112).

Particular mention is also made of the unarmed Mosquitoes flown by BOAC between Stockholm in neutral Sweden and England. These performed important roles, transporting large loads of vital ball bearings from the Swedish SKF factory and moving people including SOE personnel, in and out of Scandinavia. On one occasion, they extracted the Danish physicist Neils Bohr, who went on to play a key role in the development of the first atomic weapons under the Manhattan Project.

As mentioned, the main thread of the book is the low-level, pinpoint attacks on Gestapo bases in an attempt to free as many Resistance fighters as possible, and destroy the Gestapo files along with Gestapo personnel. The first raid was on Amiens Prison in France. The first precision raid in Denmark was on a factory in Copenhagen that was producing components for U-Boats (by 109 and 139 Squadrons led by the Australian WCDR Hughie Edwards). The Gestapo-related raids were on the university at Aarhus and the Shellhus in central Copenhagen, both used as prisons and torture centres.

The careful planning of these raids is emphasised, especially navigation, which sought to avoid known flak zones and fighter bases while bringing the aircraft precisely to the target via preselected landmarks at very low altitude. The skill of 140 Group's senior navigator Ted Sismore is highlighted. He became the most decorated RAF navigator of the war.

Space is also dedicated to the RAF Mustang squadrons based at Bentwaters that escorted the 140 Wing Mosquitoes on these remarkable raids. 135 (Polish) Squadron RAF provided many of these escorts.

For those whose interests lie solely in aviation matters, the parts of the book describing the Danish Resistance might lack appeal. For those like me with a wider interest in these things, the book weaves an interesting and at times gripping story of brave groups of people on both sides of the North Sea and the remarkable aircraft that made possible the raids that brought their destinies together. Try as hard as I might, I can't think of any other WW2 aircraft that could have successfully carried out these amazing feats than the 'Wooden Wonder' and its skilled crews.

Mosquito includes some dramatic air-to-air photos of the Aarhus and Shellhus raids taken by the crew of a Film Production Unit Mosquito that accompanied the raids. All in all, I found it an interesting and educative read.

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## **HMAC Committee meeting updates**

Your committee meets every month to discuss and manage the club's ongoing activities to ensure we comply with our obligations to CASA, MASA, MASA, Department for Environment and Water (our land owner) as well as field operations so that we all can continue to enjoy our model flying. A summary of the committee's deliberations is tabled below.

### **Committee Meeting 16 September 2025**

#### **Minutes Summary**

## Committee members present:

Andy Hollitt (President), Kirk Winters (Vice President), Kingsley Neumann (Secretary), Stewart Jackson (Treasurer), John Jefferson, Mike Nelson, Carlo Espartero.

#### Financial reports

Reports for month of August 2025 were presented by Treasurer Stewart Jackson. Total Members now 84. Club had 103 in August 2024. Income is approximately \$5000 less than expected due to reduced membership. Discussion revolved around methods to increase our income by increasing the number of members. Stewart stated that MASA and MAAA should assist our campaign. Other suggested tactics were limiting pensioner discounts, promoting in schools, promoting in Men's Sheds, promoting at Hobby Shops. Caution was expressed to ensure juniors to be at least 14 years old. Andy suggested committee volunteers to form a small group to investigate use of recently announced MASA and MAAA financial assistance for Club promotional activity. Bryan, Carlo and Andy offered to help.

#### Flying operations

CFI reportnoted reduced number of learners. Inclement weather has recently limited training.

MASA Trophy round update: It was planned to go ahead with a substitute date 20 Sept to catch-up HMAC's lost round due to weather. (This date was subsequently deferred again due to weather.)

#### Safety matters

A recent lack of control incident may have been caused by a loose servo in dual servo elevator set up. Be more careful with pre-flight inspection. Sunglare remains as primary cause.

Annual Risk Assessment of Flyaway incidents required for MAAA/MASA when damage occurs. MAAA MOPO22 (fire risk assessment) to be followed.

#### Field report

No irrigation used this winter. A new plan required for summer. There was discussion regarding the fitment of caps to close off unnecessary field sprinkler outlets (about 20). Entire field to be mown to control grasses. Caution required; continue to monitor effect on cracks.

## Buildings report

Various items of work are planned for odd jobs.

### MAAA report

Successful visit by David Mifsud to HMAC Social Meeting 5 September.

New grants proposed by MASA up to \$3000 from the state reserves per club in addition to the MAAA grants which are now capped at \$7,700 every second year.

Some clubs reported better membership renewals for 2025-26 than last year.

#### General business

- Public Trustee re Sonny Carrol Goods. Andy Hollitt action initiated by a direct interview. Now awaiting action from PT to remove goods. Our aim is to sell the storage container.
- Fire Plan has been completed and ready to submit.
- Electric Test and Tag. Allan Ayles cannot help. It was suggested a private contractor be engaged for \$125 annually. We should remove unnecessary electric items.
- Coke machine. Rob Nottle has been requested to take back the Coke machine which he owns and had on loan to the club. HMAC can assist.
- Christmas Party. Club Marion is booked for Sunday Dec 7<sup>th</sup>. It was agreed that the club should pay the \$200 room deposit for Club Marion. Advertise in BUZZ plus direct email.
- Buy and Sell Day Saturday Nov 1. Raffle sponsored by Modelflight to be confirmed. Ticket printing is required. HMAC to provide and man a table for donated goods.
- Club room gutter blocked. Also, the west storage shed gutter can be troublesome. Noted by Department for Environment & Water (our lessor). Potential water damage; to be addressed.
- Boot Scraper. One more scraper for the pilot shelter to be installed.
- Noarlunga Model Aero Sports Come and Try Day Sunday 28<sup>th</sup> September. Suggestion to offer help to NMAS as a token of friendship.
- Bunnings BBQ Marion Saturday 29th November. Need to organise a new team.
- Pilot shelter shade cloth needs repainting. Bryan Christie offered to do the job using his paint.

#### At the AGM Andy Hollitt spoke of structuring the club into teams. Here's what Andy's come up with:

The CFI manages the team, trains instructors, performs Wings tests, makes policy: Andy Hollitt. Sunday morning Instructors: Arrange to Instruct on Sunday mornings and perform Wings tests: John Jefferson, Kingsley Neumann, Ian Williams, Kirk Winters, Johann Van Wijk, Bryan Christie, Terry Gold. Other instructors: Dave Whitten, Kim Whitburn, Ashley West, Graham Paterson, Pete Robertson, Horst Dahms, Phil Norwood, Allan Ayles.

Aircraft Maintenance: Dave Whitten.

**THE MOWER TEAM:** Maintains the tractor & ride on mower. Safe Operating Procedures (SOPs). Trains drivers.

Mows the field & around the buildings. Trims grass around the arming tables and fences.

Tractor drivers: Karl Heberle, Mike Nelson, Pete Robertson.

Maintenance: Mike Schneider, Allan Ayles, Mike Nelson, Greg Peake.

Ride on mower driver: Greg Peake.

Other ride on mower drivers: Stewart Jackson, Dave Whitten, Kirk Winters, Brian Christie.

Self propelled hand mower: Dave Graham

Line trimmer/brush cutter: Ian Briggs, Andy Hollitt.

**THE GROUNDS TEAM:** Maintains the runway & the field. Maintains and operates the in ground watering system, including water distribution. Checks the water meter regularly to gauge water usage and leaks. Checks soil moisture content. Eliminates weeds. Protective equipment.

Watering system: Bryan Christie, Andy Hollitt, Kirk Winters, Stewart Jackson.

Runway, fences & field maintenance: EVERYONE! Please attend Working Bees. Filling cracks and depressions can be done at any time. A wheelbarrow, shovel & bucket are chained by the sandpit. The combination lock is the same as the gate.

Scotch thistles & herbicide: Andy Hollitt.

THE BUILDING MAINTENANCE TEAM: Maintains infrastructure (light work only).

Supervisor: Kirk Winters. Team: Kirk Winters, Mike Nelson, Bryan Christie.

THE HMAC REPRESENTATIVE: Attends MASA meetings on behalf of the Club.
